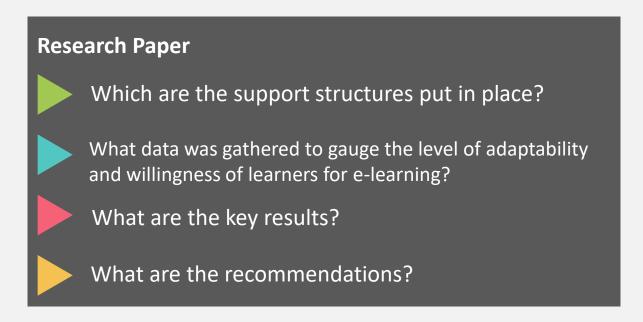
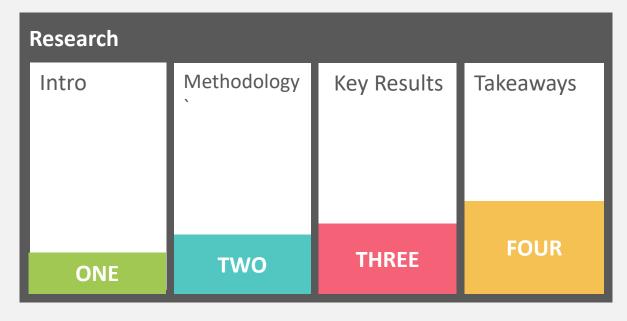
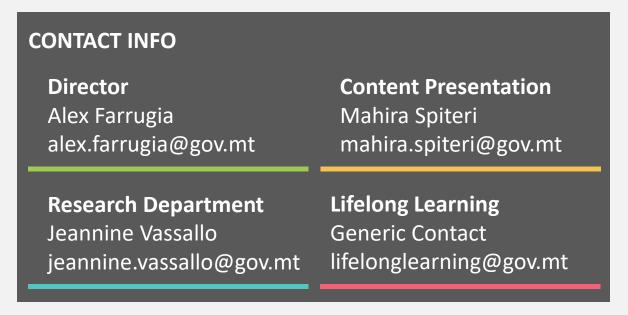
Digital Adult Education: The impact of transitioning from in-class to emergency remote learning









Introduction



DRLLE's adaptation to online learning during the Covid-19 pandemic in March 2020.

DRLLE offers general courses from MQF Level 1 to 4 with around 400 courses on offer annually.

7148 applicants/6198 unique individuals applied for academic year 2019-2020.

In response to the Covid-19 spread, educational institutions had to be abruptly closed in March 2020 and out of 400 courses delivered in-class by DRLLE, **175 courses switched from in-class to emergency remote learning**.

This paper delves into **DRLLE's experience** of rapidly shifting to emergency remote learning.

Methodology

DIGITAL INFRASTRUCTURE

Technical difficulties, internet connection, access to a device

LEARNERS' DISPOSITION

84% found it easy to follow online learning, 1/3 did not learn as much online as they did in class

42% face-to-face teaching, 22% blended learning, 14% online exclusively +75% claimed that they would be interested in continuing learning online

TRAINING IN ONLINE ANDRAGOGY

150 Tutorials, Training, Support Sessions but difficulties encountered with logging in, internet connection, following lessons

SUPPORTING LEARNERS' DIFFICULTIES

Pros: 92.7% reporting satisfactory levels of assistance from staff, coordinators and educators

Cons: Managing an online classroom

Imp: More interactive lessons

For organisations looking to make e-learning permanent, the feedback has made it clear that:

- Educators must be backed up by a **robust digital infrastructure** tailored for education
- Learners must be supported through defined and established guidelines to effectively engage in e-learning
- Policies and procedures need to be in place regarding expectations of learners and educators
- Provision of general and technical support
- For online learning to be successful, it must be **equitable** in terms of reaching learners with greater barriers to online education and organisations must be creative to further engage such cohorts in e-learning
